I was lucky enough to be given the opportunity to go on the Spirit of

Adventure, voyage #692. I was driven up to Auckland on the 14th of June to spend my first night on the boat with the other out of towners. It was quite daunting saying goodbye to my family, knowing I would be left with a group of strangers. There were a few kids who stood out to me as confident teens who were at the top of the socialising spectrum. Standing there looking at all the unfamiliar faces I felt far from confident.



After spending the first night in our not so cushiony bunks, we were joined by the remaining trainees from Auckland, which brought our head count to a grand total of 36 (not including crew). We were split into four groups - Port A, Port B. Starboard A and Starboard B - so we could each rotate around the main. mizzen, mid-ship and foredeck stations. It was full on from the get go and the crew were all hard at work teaching us the ropes. The days were long and consisted of waking up at 6:45am for the morning swims, hurrying to get in line for breakfast, attending colours (when the captain tells us the game plan for the day), cleaning the ship, going hard at it for the day with lunch in between, then getting as far forward in the dinner line as possible so we could be first to get seconds

From morning swims to climbing the rigging our days were long and eventful. We rafted to shore and did a hike on Great Barrier, we did team bonding activities and speed dating to get to know each other a bit better, we saw dolphins, whales and schools of fish and we even got to have a BBQ and toasted marshmallows at Smokehouse Bay. One of my highlights was getting to have our first shower on day 5 for a solid three minutes. 




Waihi Family Dental Centre
