In an attempt to ensure that all our students are given the best opportunity to achieve an NCEA qualification we have adopted the following approach:

- NCEA External Exams: Exam leave will be decided on a case by case basis when JHa/KMo/DCa are confident that a student will gain 80 credits towards their relevant "level" qualification. All other students will be required to be at school and in class continuing to study.

I also extend a **special welcome** to all the international students and particularly Principal Seiya Hareyama from Kyoritsu Joshi Dai Ni who are currently in our school. (Taiwan, Korea, China, Japan, South America and Europe) We hope you are having a wonderful time and settling into our Waihi way. Enjoy the opportunities that are available in our school.

The **School Ball** at the end of the holiday break was also an outstanding success. The Hall looked elegant as did our young adults who went out of their way to dress and behave in an outstanding way. Waihi College Senior Exam Week – 18th, 19th and 20th September 2018

NCEA Achievement Standard Courses include two different types assessments: internal assessments, where assessment tasks are submitted during the school year, and external assessments, assessed in November under exam conditions. Internal assessments are generally more popular as students prefer to collate their credits as the course progresses.

However, external assessments are important. Firstly, also the assessments can be used to provide NZQA with a "derived grade" in case a student (due to other unavoidable illness or circumstances) is unable to sit the November external exams. They also provide useful preparation for students heading to university, as many university courses assess under exam conditions. universities also consider specific external assessments to be of a greater value, and include these standards in their pre-requisites.


In many subjects, the externals follow a similar pattern and skill set throughout Levels 1, 2 and 3. Students who opt out of an external at Levels 1 or 2 because they have ample credits may come to regret this at Level 3! They realise that they do need the additional credits for University Entrance or an overall pass. The practice at Levels 1 and 2 would have been invaluable! Even if the credits are not required, preparing and sitting an external provides critical preparation for the same subject the following year. Remember, as the levels get higher, the courses get tougher!

Finally, the perception that internals are "easier" than externals, and require "less work" is not true. Usually most of the preparation for the externals is delivered as an integral part of the course. The work has already been done! Some of the externals are skill based, and simply require practice rather than intensive revision. Finally, our teachers provide focussed lessons, especially in Term 4, that are specifically designed to prepare

students for externals. The most important factor in success in the externals is excellent attendance, full participation in class and keeping up with homework. Burning the midnight oil is not essential!

It is our expectation that all students attempt at least one external in every Achievement Standard Course. This includes sitting the external assessments during Waihi College Senior Exam Week (18th – 20th September) and during the NZQA Secondary Exams (9th

November – 1st December). These assessments are very important: please do not book family trips or make appointments that clash with these times.
